The Candle of Hope



The Prophecy candle: Our Hope of the first Sunday of Advent is both past, present, and future. It is from ages past when God spoke in the Old Testament. It records hundreds of prophecies Jesus fulfilled. As we prepare for Christmas, it is good to recall ones like this: "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14)

Our Hope is present. When we look forward to Christmas from the perspective of a place at the foot of the cross, having already received the greatest gift of salvation, we rejoice in the hope he brings into our lives.

The Candle of Peace

The Bethlehem candle: The Second candle of Advent reminds us that the baby born in Bethlehem so long ago was the Prince of Peace (Isa. 9:6). It is he who said near the end of his earthly life, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27). His peace is for us. It is not to be grasped and hoarded but shared.

His coming to Bethlehem was as peaceful as a quite night. Max Lucado said it this way, "He came, not as a flash of light or as an unapproachable conqueror, but as one whose first cries were heard by a peasant girl and a sleepy carpenter. God tapped humanity on its collective shoulder, 'Pardon me,' he said, and eternity interrupted time, divinity interrupted carnality, and heaven interrupted the earth in the form of a baby. Christianity was born in one big heavenly interruption."

The Candle of Love

The Angels candle: The Fourth candle of Advent represents love. I associate the Christmas Angels with glory. "And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid.... And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God, and saying, Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men" (Luke 2:9, 13-14). This glory suggests the shekinah glory or Presence of God with us, shekinah literally means "to dwell." And who had come to dwell with us, Jesus, the incarnation of God's love to humanity. Thus, those who angels who came to announce the birth of love incarnate, for God is love (1 John 4:8), are fittingly representative of love.

Now, for those who are "too late" to prepare for Christmas all month, if you have at least four days remaining before Christmas, light one candle each night and contemplate one of the great themes of Christmas represented by that candle ending with the Christ candle on Christmas. (You can use the devotional above or simply read the verses listed below related to the meaning of each candle.) Not enough time for that, well, do all the candles on that fair day, Christmas itself! Make a dramatic ceremony of reading the Christmas story (Luke 1:26-38 and 2:1-20) and lighting the candles (all at once or one by one) as you read.

Here are some verses illustrating the meaning of each candle: First candle: Hope—Isaiah 7:14 and Luke 1:26-38 Second candle: Peace—Micah 5:2 and Luke 2:1-7 Third candle: Joy—Luke 2:8-20 Fourth candle: Love—1 John 4:9-19 Christ Candle: John 1:18

Just remember, if you are using the preparation time of Advent to anticipate and rejoice and worship at the Birth of Jesus, you can't do it "wrong."
